Hello everyone

A warm welcome back to our final season on what has proven to be an incredibly inspirational theme of Land.

Our cover image is from one of three exhibitions taking place in the Peter Scott Gallery this season, Louise Ann Wilson's Becoming Rock, a deeply personal perspective on our theme. Before that, we will welcome Are You Lost? from artist Rob St John, a sound, film and textile installation that we have taken to locations throughout the Forest of Bowland this summer as part of Nature Calling. Could We Dream in Colour..., a collaboration between artists James Fox and Dave Shooter is a political exploration of Land, leading us nicely into next year's theme, which we can exclusively reveal will be...Dissent.

We have another bumper concert programme for you with five fascinating and original performances, beginning with the UK premiere of a 'neurorecital' with pianist Nicolas Namoradze. We bring an exciting new collaboration with violinist Braimah Kanneh-Mason and pianist Jâms Coleman for a stunning musical programme that includes Dvořák's Songs Mv Mother Taught Me. Renowned clarinettist Emma Johnson brings an unusual and diverse programme that responds to our theme of Land and we finish the season with pianist **Jonathan** Ferrucci for An Evening with JS Bach. For those looking for something a little bit different, we welcome the multi-awardwinning Czech chamber ensemble Trio Bohémo.

We will be partnering again with Lancaster Litfest to bring the UK's Poet Laureate Simon Armitage for On Land and Poetry. Sue Palmer and Sheila Ghelani's Atmospheric Forces comes to the Nuffield Theatre for their unique performance with objects, a table and a talk about the interconnections in nature. This has limited seat numbers and will sell out fast.

Ali Matthews returns, this time, with Mushroom Language: A Fungal Gothic about the life cycles that shape us all through folk horror and humour.

As ever, there are plenty of free things to get involved with, both in our venues and out and about, but rather than put them all on page 3, as we have before, we have chosen to give them equal billing in the brochure so they have their own pages! These include the chance to help shape an **Exhibition in a Day**, and our usual artist conversations so read on to find out more and sign up to the mailing list as new events are added all the time.

Multi award-winning pianist and composer Nicolas Namoradze returns to Lancaster Arts, following his enchanting concert at Lancaster Priory in 2023.

Join us for the UK premiere of a unique concert, featuring video projection displaying what is happening in the pianist's brain during the performance. Explore what can be understood about these pieces of music and what it means to play them by looking 'inside' the inner landscape of Nicolas' mind.

Nicolas presents recital formats that reimagine the concert experience through a range of innovative projects, and furthers his postgraduate studies at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology and Neuroscience. The works in the second half of the programme mirror those in the first, opening with Scriabin's so-called "Insect" Sonata is an iconic exploration of nature, the earth and land, and the concert concludes with Nicolas' own arrangement of Ravel's celebrated Suite No. 2 from his ballet Daphnis et Chloé.

Nicolas came to international attention in 2018 upon winning the triennial Honens International Piano Competition in Canada. Among the most critically acclaimed musicians of his generation, he was bestowed the 2020 & 2021 Young Pianist Award by the UK Critics' Circle.

Rob St John: Are You Lost?

Join us on 8 October for drop-in screen printing, 1-4pm, to create a unique memento of the installation. Are You Lost? is a sound, film and textile artwork from artist Rob St John. The installation has spent the summer travelling through the Forest of Bowland and this is a unique opportunity to enjoy it here in Lancaster. What connects you to the Forest of Bowland?

Over the last year, Rob has been working with people in and around Bowland, exploring themes of environmental justice, land access and personal perspectives and connections to the landscape. The installation has been created through these conversations, and weaves together voices, field recordings and choral improvisations. The textile element is a collaboration with textile artist Kate O'Farrell, drawing upon the cotton mill weaving practices of East Lancashire and the textile traditions of Gujarat in India, alongside natural materials and processes derived from the Bowland landscape.

Are You Lost? is part of a national programme called Nature Calling, commissioned by the Forest of Bowland National Landscape and produced by Lancaster Arts.

Multi award-winning Trio Bohémo make their Lancaster debut in the Great Hall with an evening that blends the worlds of contemporary classical and folk music.

The Czech trio has swiftly emerged as a force on the international chamber music scene and this evening's programme brings together vibrant voices from central Europe, past and present. Moving from Webster-Zuber's evocative Rhapsody to Schubert's luminous Notturno and Rejcha's elegant Trio in A Major, offering contrasting glimpses of early Romantic lyricism. Dvořák's Trio traverses a vivid Slavic landscape encompassing everything from melancholy to joy, before Vičar's folk-inspired 'From Moravia' closes the programme with a modern reimagining of traditional song.

Founded in 2019, Trio Bohémo's rise has been remarkable, winning the prestigious Parkhouse Award in 2021 and first prize at the International Joseph Haydn Chamber Music Competition in Vienna in 2023. Their highly anticipated 2024 debut album received glowing 5-star reviews from BBC Music and Classica magazines and was selected as the Guardian's Classical Album of the Week.

Lancaster Arts is delighted to welcome one of the UK's leading clarinettists, Emma Johnson, in concert with pianist John Lenehan.

The concert begins with virtuosic pieces from Mozart and Weber for both instruments, before a second half that responds to our 2025 theme of Land. Both Peter Sculthorpe's work rooted in the sounds of Saibai, an island near Papua New Guinea, and Vaughan Williams' music based on English folk songs, reflect the stories of people moving from land out to sea. Senegal Spirit pays homage to the traditional music of Senegal and the Benny Goodman Medley includes music redolent of the jazz scene in 1930s Chicago.

Described by The Times as "Britain's favourite clarinettist", Emma Johnson is one of the few clarinet players to have made a career as a soloist. Since winning the BBC Young Musician of the Year at the age of seventeen, she is known for her diverse repertoire. She was awarded an MBE by the Queen in 1996.

With more than 80 albums to his credit, reflecting an enormous variety of genres and styles, John Lenehan ranks as one of the most versatile pianists on the classical scene today.



Louise Ann Wilson: Becoming Rock

Louise will facilitate a creative drawing/mapping workshop aimed at women wanting to explore experiences of health related life-events on Tuesday 11 November, 3-5pm.

Season Celebration Tuseday 11 November, 5.30pm Peter Scott Gallery Becoming Rock offers a deeply personal perspective on our 2025 theme of Land, exploring the artist's landscape-based responses to two recent major life-events: a radical hysterectomy resulting in surgical menopause and breast cancer which led to multiple surgeries.

Through photography, film, prints, and experimental drawings, Louise documents her experiences within rocky landscapes chosen for their physical, psychological, and metaphorical resonance, and encourages us to relate our own life experiences, whatever they may be, to the landscape.

Responding to her cancer diagnosis, the artist seeks out boulders where she films and photographs her body, making connections between the calcium rich limestone landscape and the 'calcification' occurring within her own tissue. Experiences of radical hysterectomy are sited in the dramatic slate-quarried landscapes of the Lake District, drawing parallels between the surgically quarried body and quarried land. A series of site-specific walks explore the effects of menopause using a process of walking and menopause map-drawing.

Over the past year, Lancaster Arts has been exploring the theme of Land with artists, researchers, community groups and with people whose lives and livelihoods are rooted in the landscape as well as those who may feel more disconnected. In recent months, we've hosted residencies with artists Kate Fox and Ellie Harrison alongside academics from Lancaster University, to see where their creative explorations and thinking might take them.

Across these residencies, compelling questions have emerged: What is our personal attachment to the landscapes around us? How do we find our place in a landscape, shape it and be shaped by it? What is the relationship between our inner landscapes and the physical ones around us? Join us for a meaningful, fun and creative exploration of your own connection with land, deepen your understanding of what land connection may mean for others, and gain insights into using creative processes to explore significant issues.

Please bring your own experiences of connections to the landscapes. Our partners artists and academics will share some of the questions and responses they have had to this theme in the last year.

Lancaster Arts is proud to bring violinist, Braimah Kanneh-Mason and pianist Jâms Coleman to the Great Hall this autumn. In this new collaboration, two of the leading young musicians in England have come together to explore a beautiful and varied programme of music which pairs two dramatic sonatas with lyrical miniatures, that bridge tenderness, nostalgia, and quiet intensity.

Braimah is a member of the Kanneh-Mason Piano Trio and Kaleidoscope Collective. He has collaborated with artists such as Nicola Benedetti, Tom Poster, Priya Mitchell and the London Philharmonic Orchestra, regularly performing at prestigious festivals and venues in the UK and internationally including the BBC Proms, Wigmore Hall, Barbican Hall, and Kings Place.

Jâms Coleman performs as a solo pianist, chamber musician, and vocal accompanist. His deeply sensitive pianism and explorations of interesting repertoire have made him a regular feature of many festivals and venues such as the Aldeburgh Festival, BBC Proms, Wigmore Hall, The Royal Concertgebouw (Amsterdam), and LSO St Lukes.

We are very excited to welcome Poet Laureate Simon Armitage for our year on Land – how more perfect could an author be for this theme? The evening will celebrate two of his recent illustrated collections, Blossomise and Dwell, as well as his latest collection. New Cemetery.

Blossomise celebrates spring through haikus inspired by the Japanese blossom festival, and longer lyrical pieces, while Dwell could be seen as a plea for humans to slow down and reflect. New Cemetery starts with the conversion of a local beauty spot into a municipal graveyard, as Simon takes a series of walks round his West Yorkshire home, drawing the reader into a parallel neighbourhood of remembrance and celebration.

Simon will be joined for a conversation by poet, Kim Moore, the author of two prize-winning collections of poetry.

Simon Armitage is Poet Laureate of the UK and Professor of Poetry at the University of Leeds. His collections have received numerous prizes and awards and he writes extensively for television, radio and theatre, and is the author of novels and non-fiction best-sellers.

Lancaster Arts is thrilled to welcome Ali Matthews back to the Nuffield Theatre for her latest show Mushroom Language: A Fungal Gothic.

They eat nappies They eat toothbrushes They eat bombs

They eat newspapers about how the world will end... a species running slowly in parallel preaching change silently digesting muck into matter and back again.

This show is about the cycles that shape us – eruption, reproduction and decay, perfectly suited to our year on the theme of Land.

In an eerie and funny homage to folk horror, two human performers absorb and mimic 'mushroom language' through ritual and power dynamics. Who are these creatures, and what are the mushrooms trying to tell them? Mushrooms offer us a lens into a more sustainable future, but nature is hilarious and terrifying.

Ali Matthews is an artist working in performance, music and video and last toured to Lancaster Arts with The Witching Way, created with Leo Burtin, in 2019, following its premiere at the Royal Exchange in Manchester.

James Fox and Dave Shooter: Could We Dream in Colour...

On 4 December, James and Dave will join us for an evening of debate, disruption (and maybe even some dancing) as we look back on a year of considering land, and look forward to our 2026 theme, Dissent.

For a final exploration of our 2025 theme Land, Could We Dream in Colour..., a creative investigation into the politics of land use and ownership, explores the complicated relationship between land, power and belonging that underpin our everyday geographies. Using creative tactics, this collaboration between James Fox and Dave Shooter disrupts the idea that land is only something to be measured, owned, or enclosed.

Working across sound, embroidery, print, and film, Could We Dream in Colour... challenges our ideas about land; as property, as resource, as environment. Through acts of creative remapping, the works disrupt both visible and invisible borders.

It is also a proposal. The work gestures toward alternative ways of experiencing place and lays the foundation for more inclusive, just, and communal ways of being in and with the world. In doing so, Could We Dream in Colour.... points toward the possibility of a 'Romantic Revolution' of the land through creative action and political re-imagination.

James Fox is an artist and researcher engaged with alternative histories and possible futures.

Dave Shooter/Guerrilla Biscuits is a sound artist and musician working primarily with field recordings gleaned from an area to curate place-based immersive sonic journeys.

We warmly welcome Jonathan Ferrucci's return to Lancaster after his enchanting concert at the Priory in 2020, this time to the Great Hall for an evening of Bach.

The English Suites are a collection of six suites for keyboard by J.S.Bach and known for their complex musical structures. While the name suggests an English connection, it's more likely a reference to their form, which shares similarities with French keyboard suites. Following the release of his debut album of the complete Bach Toccatas earlier this year, Jonathan wanted to continue his exploration of Bach with the more organised structures of the English Suites, which he will record in 2026.

Italian-Australian pianist Jonathan Ferrucci has given concerts as a soloist and chamber musician across Europe, Australia and the United States, performing in Wigmore Hall, Barbican Hall and Kings Place in London, Carnegie Weill Hall in New York and the Fazioli Concert Hall in Italy, among other venues.

Artists making exciting work across a range of media will be joined by researchers or those working in relevant fields to discuss the ideas, themes and questions driving their work. There will be plenty of opportunity for the audience to join in the conversation and connect with artists working in our region and beyond.

Rebecca Chesney 7 October In person

Rebecca's work is concerned with how we perceive land: how we romanticise, translate and define it. She looks at how politics, ownership, and commercial value all influence our surroundings, investigates the impact of human activities on nature, and considers how our understanding is fed by a confused mix of truth and fiction. Her works take the form of installations, interventions, habitat creation, drawings, maps and walks.



Sophie Mahon 14 October In person

Sophie Mahon is a socially engaged artist and producer whose multidisciplinary practice spans film, interactive arts, sculpture, and installation. Their work is rooted in close collaboration, responding to a range of social, political, economic, and environmental issues, with a focus on creating inclusive spaces that encourage open dialogue, collective creativity, and points of connection within communities.

Louise Ann Wilson 11 November In person

Louise creates site-specific walking-performances, installations, films, and photographic images that situate life-events in rural landscapes—with transformative outcomes. Intersecting art and medicine, her practice has addressed breast cancer and surgery, hysterectomy and surgical menopause, terminal illness and bereavement, in/fertility, and childlessness-by-circumstance.

Emily is a multidisciplinary artist based in London. Working across moving image, photography, printmaking, and sculpture, she explores themes of grief, identity, and transgenerational trauma. Drawing from her mixed Caribbean, English, and Scottish heritage, Mitchell reimagines memory and belonging, challenging colonial narratives and honouring erased histories.

Debbie Yare 25 November In person

Debbie's art comes out of an embodied dialogue with Morecambe Bay. She researches how ever-changing ecosystems such as salt marshes and estuaries have been suppressed through human activities and, in turn, how they can reshape and inform our responses to climate change. She works across media in photography, video, drawing, writing, performance and socially engaged practice.


Driving?
