Hello everyone

Welcome to the Lancaster Arts year of FLIGHT, a theme which will be explored by artists working across all artforms, some brand new to us and some returning to Lancaster after a few years. Our theme was inspired by Turkish artist Sena Başöz when we were lucky enough to purchase her work, Forough, a flying archive. This will fill the Peter Scott Gallery with images of birds, representing individual lives left devoid of freedom or lost. This moving installation opens our season, alongside the joyous Gandini Juggling's The Games We Play, a playful and amusing reimagining of juggling and yet another perspective on flight!

We have a special treat when cellist Maja Bugge performs her new work, **Suite for Seabirds**, in the gallery, with the songs of the declining seabird population. These explorations continue with the return, in April, of contemporary music collective, Propellor, to the Nuffield Theatre with **Flight Patterns**.

Our concert series is chock-full of goodies, with Leeds International Piano Competition winner **Alim Beisembayev**, Manchester Camerata's immersive work **Hearing Voices** with Karen Cargill, and a return of singer, **Roderick Williams**. If this wasn't enough, the season completes with the Grammy nominated American violinist. **Ariana Kim**.

The Nuffield Theatre will host Andy Smith's participatory work, A Citizens' Assembly, that asks questions of us and the climate emergency, and Susan Kempster's Common Ground, a unique evening of performance and dance exploring the process of ageing across generations. Finally, we are honoured to have Action Hero back, with their renowned production of The Talent.

We're delighted to welcome back José García Oliva to the gallery with **Out of Hours**, a collaborative installation with the cleaners, porters, and security staff of Lancaster University that playfully explores labour and the often-unnoticed contributions that shape our workplaces.

Amongst all of this, we are touring for the first time to communities along the river Lune, our performance of **River Tours**.

As always, there are a lot of opportunities to engage with our work, free of charge and situated outside the campus. We are introducing an advance ticket deal this season. All details are in this brochure but please sign up to our mailing list to ensure you don't miss out.

We are excited about this extraordinary season and look forward to welcoming you.

Lancaster Arts is thrilled to welcome back award-winning contemporary circus company Gandini Juggling to the Nuffield Theatre as they celebrate their 30th anniversary. What better way to open our season on the theme of Flight than with the art of juggling, though not as we know it.

Enter the joyous, complex world of juggling and choreography with this eye-opening user guide that pretends to be a show (or is it a show that pretends to be a lecture?). The Games We Play is a celebratory exploration that asks what is juggling and what can it be? And what is art and what can art be? You'll be dazzled and delighted as they answer these and other questions in inimitable, gravity-defying style.

The Games We Play is an animated self-portrait of a pioneering duo and their company, with a repertoire of some thirty productions staged more than six thousand times all over the world. 
8 February 5.30–7.30pm All welcome Join us for Gandini Juggling in the Nuffield Theatre at 7.30pm Join us as Sena Başöz's immersive installation, Forough, fills the Peter Scott Gallery with birds, marking the launch of our annual theme of Flight.

Forough is a flying archive, representing individual lives that have been restricted, left devoid of freedom or lost. The title of the work comes from the first name of Iranian poet Forough Farrokhzad and her famous line: "Keep the flight in mind, the bird may die".

The work is composed of hundreds of photographs of taxidermied birds from a 19th century natural history collection based in Istanbul. Re-animated by an artificial wind, the images fill the space with sound reminiscent of bird's wings and murmurations.

Lancaster Arts is excited to have acquired Forough in 2022 with support from the Contemporary Art Society. Come and experience this exciting and timely addition to the collection, displayed for the first time in the UK.

Sena Başöz is based in Istanbul, Turkey and works across different media. Sena seeks ways of interacting with what is considered out of reach, often working with archives, and creates work which investigates healing.

Lancaster Arts welcomes Leeds International Piano Competition winner of 2021, Alim Beisembayev to the Great Hall for the very first time with this dramatic concert programme.

Alim is fascinated by the exploration of colours in romantic music throughout its history and this French and Russian programme explores colour and storytelling through the piano. The deep darkness of Ravel's fleeting 'Gaspard de la nuit' and the dramatic richness of Rachmaninov's Sonata prove the works to be pinnacles of 20th century piano literature.

Announced as a BBC New Generation Artist for 2023–25, Alim made his BBC Proms debut in 2023, performing Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto No. 2 with the Sinfonia of London. In 2022, Warner Classics released Alim's critically-acclaimed debut album: Liszt Transcendental Études, featuring all twelve of the composer's etudes.

Maja Bugge Cello and Electronics Internationally acclaimed cellist and composer Maja Bugge comes to the Peter Scott Gallery with a solo performance interacting with the Forough exhibition.

Maja will perform her new work commissioned by the European City of Culture, using motifs and rhythms from the songs of declining Arctic seabirds.

Like Sena Başöz, Maja explores the traces of movement and loss in a rapidly changing bird population. This will be a powerful, one-off opportunity to experience this installation through a musical score. Be amongst the first to hear this important and relevant new work by Maja Bugge.

Maja Bugge is a Norwegian cellist and composer based in Lancaster. Since 1998 she has created a large body of work both as a solo artist and in collaboration with others. Her work has been commissioned by Manchester Jazz festival, Lancaster Arts, Full of Noises, National Theatre Oslo and Jazz North.

River Tours was commissioned in 2022 in partnership with renowned theatre company Stan's Cafe as part of their international touring project on the rivers of the world. With an intricate textile map created out of recycled materials by Sewing Café Lancaster, a beautiful text by Claire Dean and actor, Orla Cottingham as our guide, River Tours: The Lune is a collaborative project exploring the river's environment, wildlife, social history and folklore.

After the captivating premiere two years ago, Lancaster Arts and Sewing Café Lancaster are now bringing this work to rural locations along the river itself, from Sunderland Point, to Halton, to Arkholme, with many more to be announced. The tour is supported by Arts Council England and the Lune Rivers Trust.

With Williams, a recital is more than just a selection of beautifully sung miniatures. He sings with all of the BBC orchestras, many other major UK orchestras and at the Royal Opera House, Opera North and Scottish Opera. In 2023, he sang at the coronation of King Charles III.

Roger Vignoles is recognised worldwide as one of the leading piano accompanists of our time. In a career already spanning nearly four decades he has partnered many eminent artists, including Sir Thomas Allen, Olaf Bar and many more.


Common Ground is a unique evening of performance from dance artist and choreographer, Susan Kempster, featuring three pieces exploring ageing.

The Talent is a new show by Action Hero and Deborah Pearson about the voice and human presence in the 21st Century. Where does the voice live? How will her voice live on, outside her body, if it can take on a life of its own? The Talent asks what kind of ghosts will haunt us when we're gone, and what the legacy of the human voice might be in a non-human future.

Action Hero is the hugely respected collaboration between artists Gemma Paintin and James Stenhouse, who create artworks that expand across artforms — performance, installation, sound and digital — and have toured work to over 40 countries across five continents.

Ariana is joined by Michael Poll who has performed across North and South America and Europe. In 2022, he conducted the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra at Lancaster House.

Garth Gratrix 16 January (Peter Scott Gallery)

This talk is rescheduled from the autumn 2023 season. Garth is a visual artist based in Blackpool, whose work focuses on 'formal frolic' and the queering of spaces, using a self-imposed form of regulation of 'nine inches apart, together, away, repeat'. Garth, alongside artist Jez Dolan, exhibited their show 'How do you make a Queer Ritual' at the Peter Scott Gallery in autumn 2023.

Tam Joseph 23 January (Zoom)

Tam Joseph is a Dominica-born British painter, sculptor and graphic designer who emigrated to the UK in 1955. Joseph's practice often combines humour with serious political narratives to challenge contemporary realities and their inherent contradictions. Awareness, diaspora, identity and world history remain recurrent themes in his work.

Jasleen Kaur 30 January (Zoom)

Jasleen Kaur is an artist from Glasgow. Their practice explores the malleability of culture and social histories in the things that surround us. Their latest show Alter Altar at the Glasgow Tramway, uses a series of installations and kinetic, musical sculptures to explore political ideologies and how they are transferred into communal and public spaces.



Tuesday Talks

Liz Clough 6 Febuary (Peter Scott Gallery)

Elizabeth is an artist based in Morecambe who will share her ideas behind her recent solo show Earthworks, focusing on the cyclical, sacred and fundamental nature of basic materials. She explores our ethereal digital world's reliance upon the same materials that ancient civilisations used, and contemplates a relationship between witchcraft and science. God and sand.

Sarah Casey 20 Febuary (Peter Scott Gallery)

Sarah Casey will discuss her recent project Emergency! which took place in Switzerland. Sarah is using drawing to reflect on the emerging challenges of glacial archaeology, as the ice in which artefacts have been preserved for years, centuries or millennia is now melting at unprecedented rates due to climate change, putting the artefacts at risk.

Hetain Patel 27 Febuary (Zoom)

Hetain Patel is a London-based artist and filmmaker, and has previously presented his shows American Man and Be Like Water at Lancaster Arts. Hetain will discuss his exploration of identity and freedom through comic books, film, TV and pop culture. The talk will focus on his personal and socio-political perspectives, delving into characters such as Spider-Man, Kung Fu and Black Panther.

Sin Wai Kin 5 March (Zoom)

Sin Wai Kin will discuss their artistic practice, spanning performance, moving image, writing and print. Their talk will cover influences, recent projects and the significance of storytelling in their work. Kin's recent film, A Dream of Wholeness in Parts, was nominated for the 2022 Turner Prize, and explores alternate worlds portraying experiences of desire, identification and consciousness.


Driving?

Use the LA1 4YW postcode with your Sat Nav. Exit the M6 motorway at junction 33 and take the A6 north towards Lancaster. Turn right at the third set of traffic lights on the A6 onto the University main drive. Take the first exit left from the roundabout at the top of the hill, and park in Visitor Zone A.

Visitor Parking is free in any zone on campus after 6pm and all day during the weekends. The nearest visitor parking zone is 'A'. For weekday parking use the pay and display machines or purchase a parking scratchcard at the security lodge.

Buses run every 5–20 minutes from the city centre to campus. For timetables contact Stagecoach or call Traveline on 0871 200 22 33.
